"If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have

love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.

Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away. For we know in part and we prophesy in part, but when completeness comes, what is in part disappears. When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put the ways of childhood behind me. For now we see only a reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known. And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love."

1 Corinthians 13:1-13

Whew! It has been a year with much transition. For many of us, it has felt like a nonstop transition. Saying goodbye to clergy, welcoming another, transitions of our beloved worship coordinator, Sherry, and graduations and life changes are just a few of the transitions of this past year. Sometimes, these transitions are wonderful realties, yet much of the time, it can be filled with growing pains, adjustments, and fear. Life so often is filled with these juxtapositions that can leave us scrambling for the 'what's next, button.' In these moments, it is important for us as people of God to consider what these seasons mean for us as a church and as individuals. Change is never easy. As creatures of habit, we like it when there is continuity and predictability. I want to thank you all for continuing to journey with us at JUMC in this constant season of change. I wish as a pastor that I could say that our changes are over for us because it must feel like we surely have met our quota. Yet, I cannot offer the news that this occurred because while it may offer comfort to some, if we deny change(s), we then do not live fully within the resurrection power of the Gospel. We serve a God whose inbreaking is all around us. At times, it can be clear of the God movements around us. For example, we see some of these moments when we hear of a loved one who recovers from an illness or when we are met with an answered prayer. Those are the 'lucky' moments because sometimes we are not always aware of those answered prayer moments right away. Instead, it might feel like being tested or being sent through the refiner's fire. Later, we understand more fully how Christ is at work within the moment(s).

Thankfully, we are given ways to understand our faith. There are so many stories, pictures, and symbols all around us to help us glean what it means to live as resurrection people and to understand the power of the resurrection narrative in our lives. Within the Christian Church, the symbol of a butterfly is exemplified to the power and nature of resurrection within our lives. There are four lifecycles for butterflies: each one draws closer to the fulfillment and embodiment of new life. In this instance, we move from egg, larva, pupa, to adult. There's an image. Egg-→ wiggly caterpillar→--blob, otherwise known as pupa → beautiful butterfly. Change. Metamorphosis.

This cycle is one that completely changes this little creature. It shifts from something that could seem insignificant to us as humans. Caterpillars may seem gross. A creepy crawly that is not overly beautiful to many transitioning into a beautiful, colorful, life filled butterfly. A creepy crawly to a changed instrument that takes flight as it lives in fulfillment of God's purposes.

We too live within this. We begin our lives. We learn, and we grow. Sometimes for the better and sometimes for the worst. We are called in this work towards resurrection. We are called to live into the life changing and life-giving work of Christ, and for us to do this means that we have to be open to the Spirit of Christ in our midst. We are called to love. But, we know love is more than just saying I love you. Or, I love you if you believe like I do, or I love you if you look like I do, or I love you if you act, think, feel like I do. Jesus did not love like that. Jesus did not love within parameters. Jesus did not require a litmus test to share his love, and he requires the same of us. We are called to live a life of love, and it is when we do this that we move towards resurrection. It is then that we have our butterfly moment. For, we will allow love to take wing. Within the world, and within us. Brothers and sisters, let us love as Christ. Let us be welcome to the power of resurrection that is in our midst.

We will have containers available at both welcome desks at church to collect supplies—or you can make up a complete bucket yourself! Then, in the summer, we'll take a trip over to New Castle, PA to deliver them to the Mission Barn there.


#### **Supply List**

- One five-gallon round bucket with resealable lid (14.35" h x 12.19" w x 12.19" d)
  - No screw lids
  - May be used, but must be free from all residual product
  - Advertisements on the outside acceptable
- One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner
  - No spray cleaners
- One 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap
- One 4-8 oz. pump spray air freshener (liquid, not gel)
- One 6-14 oz. pump spray insect repellent (pack of 10-20 wipes also acceptable)
  - Pump spray bottles must have protective covers
- One scrub brush
  - With or without handle

- 18 re-useable cleaning wipes
  - No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels
  - Remove from packaging
- Five scouring pads
  - No stainless-steel pads with soap in them
  - Remove from packaging
- 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line)
- 24 roll of heavy-duty trash bags (33-45-gallon sizes)
  - Remove from packaging
- Five N95 particulate respirator dust masks (1-3 mm thickness)
  - No surgical masks
- Two pairs kitchen gloves
  - Durable for multiple uses
  - Remove from packaging
- One pair work gloves
  - Cotton with leather palm or all leather

#### **Assembly Instructions**

- All items must be new with the exception of the bucket and lid which may be recycled but must be clean and free of debris.
- All cleaning agents must be liquid form. No powders are accepted.
  - If items have been omitted, label bucket. Please indicate which items are missing.


