

Let the games begin! As many of you probably are aware, I *love* the Olympics, and as you read this, the 2024 Paris Olympics are in full swing. We even kicked them off as a church with our very own JUMC Olympics at our Family Night Cookout & Campfire! Indeed, the Olympics can be a quite exciting time for fans such as me and my family. How about you?

The thing which I appreciate about the Olympics – aside from the thrill of the competition and the heart-warming stories of athletes who overcame significant obstacles to get to this point – is the fact that for 17 days, the world (mostly!) puts aside their differences and comes together. Indeed, it always tugs on my heartstrings to see all these athletes represent their country and perch themselves under their country's flag, while at the same time embracing one another for the good of sport and companionship. In other words, for these 2 ½ weeks, the world comes together. All the turmoil and struggles in our world seem to take a back seat.

It is no secret that we are living in a divided and polarized country and world right now. The animosity towards one another and the violence which accompanies those feelings is through the roof. And we continue to witness the fallout from all these in our country day in and day out. Furthermore, we know that it will only get worse as we approach what will surely be another hotly contested presidential election filled with hateful rhetoric on both sides. In fact, we have already seen this ugliness take center stage! Where do we go from here? How do we respond as the Church?

In moments like these, I recall the words of Paul in his letter to the Ephesians:

"²Always be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. ³Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves together with peace. ⁴For there is one body and one Spirit, just as you have been called to one glorious hope for the future" (Eph. 4:2-4, NLT).

Indeed, the way to fight all this divisiveness is to strive to be humble and gentle with one another...to love in all that we do. After all, Jesus tells us over and over to "love one another." Remember, we are one body and one Spirit, and polarization has no place in our desire for a glorious hope into the future.

In other words, may we be like the Spirit of the Olympics and come together amid all the hate that surrounds us. May we remember that we are one body in Christ. May we practice love with one another and put aside the differences which separate us. For ultimately, the way we combat the hateful rhetoric which exists is to span the bridge of division with love. Let love be our leader. Let love show us the way. Let us remember Paul's beautiful words to the Romans:

"³⁸For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us form the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 8:38-38, NRSV).

Yes, my friends, that is the promise we live with. For though the Olympics brings the world together for just a short time, Christ's love unites and overcomes all for all eternity. And so, may we as the Church lead the way to love. Indeed, may it be so!



She believes that choral singing is unique as an art form because singers are working together to create something beautiful. She just completed her tenth and last year as director of the Lake Erie College Chorus. Mary received her Bachelor of Music Education from Bowling Green State conducting with Richard Mathey and Dr. Ivan Trussler.



Maribeth Davis grew up in Conneaut, Ohio and earned her bachelor's degree in music education (voice concentration) from the Dana School of Music @Youngstown State Coordinator University. While there, she worked as secretary to the director of theatre and appeared in numerous plays, musicals, and operas. She was an original member of the distinguished

Dana Chorale; the University Chorus; and the Marching Band. She continued her education at Lake Erie College, where she completed her MSE in Curriculum and Supervision. She did post-graduate work at The Ohio State University, Vandercook College of Music, and Kent State University.

Maribeth began her teaching career at Grand Valley Local Schools where she taught K-12 general music, choir, and assisted with marching band. The bulk of her career was spent at Pymatuning Valley Schools as their 4-12 general music teacher; director of choirs; and assistant band director. Davis also directed the high school spring musicals and created the Laker Sound Waves Show Choir. She was twice nominated as PV's Teacher of the Year candidate and was a Martha Holden Jennings Scholar. She was called from retirement twice to help reinstate the primary music program when budget cuts interrupted the program. While at PV, Davis held several leadership positions with the teachers union, and was a founding board member of the reorganized ACTS (Andover Community Theatre Society), and directed their children's musicals for many years. Theatre was always a passion, and ironically Mb was leading lady to the late Ron Cramer in the Ashtabula Arts Center production of Oklahoma! She credits Ron with leading her in faith development.

Davis served the Orwell North Presbyterian church for over twenty years as their organist, choir director, and pastoral assistant. She has played and sung for numerous churches throughout Ashtabula County; and currently plays keyboard and cantors for Our Lady of Hope in Andover and Kinsman on Saturday afternoons. Her love of theatre continues by playing keyboard, and musical directing shows at Arlene's Broadway on Buffalo in Conneaut.

When Maribeth was hired as organist in June of 2023, the JUM team thought she would be leaving in October for FL but took a chance and hired her anyhow. Little did anyone suspect JUM would be stuck with her! Maribeth and Bob realized in July of 2023 that her parents' health was declining rapidly, and they knew that a return to OH was necessary. They purchased a home in Andover and moved in October of 2023. Her father and mother moved in with them in December, and when her dad died on Mb's Jan. 3 birthday, mom Bernie stayed on.

Maribeth is grateful for the support and willingness to let her continue as organist and also music coordinator. She is looking forward to working with Pastor Jeremy and Marybeth" (how's that for irony?) as we continue to build on the rich tradition of musical variety and excellence here at JUMchurch.

Both she and Bob felt welcomed and accepted immediately and feel that they have found a church home and family here at Jefferson United Methodist Church, and plan to continue to grow in faith for many years to come.





Bishop Hee-Soo Jung Assigned to the New Ohio Episcopal Area as of September 1

The North Central Jurisdiction Committee on the Episcopacy has assigned Bishop Hee-Soo Jung to be resident bishop of the new Ohio Episcopal Area effective September 1. He will be bishop of both the East Ohio Conference and the West Ohio Conference of The United Methodist Church.

Jung has served as resident bishop of the Wisconsin Conference for the past 12 years after previously serving eight years as bishop of the Northern Illinois Conference. Under his commitment to increase racial justice and radical inclusion, the Wisconsin Conference has reached 49% of its appointments being served by cross-racial leadership.

He has served as president of the General Board of Global Ministries since 2016 and chair of the United Methodist Korean National Plan since 2012.

Bishop Jung earned a Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He also holds an M.A. from the Institute of Buddhist Studies, affiliated with the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, CA; an M.A. from the Dongguk University Graduate School in Seoul, South Korea; and a B.Th. from the Methodist Theological Seminary in Seoul, South Korea.

He and his wife Im-Hyon, an Elder in the Wisconsin Conference, are the parents of two adult children and the grandparents of one.

Bishop Tracy S. Malone has been assigned resident bishop of the Indiana Conference as of September 1.

CURRENT CHURCH-WIDE FOCUS FRUITFUL PRACTICES: A GUIDE TO VISION FOR THE ONE BODY

We are currently in the middle of a new church-wide focus on the five fruitful practices of a congregation. These practices were first identified by United Methodist Bishop Robert Schnase in a book he wrote in 2007 as aspects of a church's mission and vision that must be present for the Church to be vital in ministry. Thus, they have been used in various circles since to help churches develop a plan for vitality, including for many years in our own East Ohio Conference. And so, many of us have probably heard them drilled into us over and over, and they may even seem redundant at this point, but I think we all could use a reminder from time to time.

At the beginning of July, we finished our focus on spiritual gifts - discussing how we all have been given gifts to work towards the vision of our one body. And it takes us all working cooperatively and collectively to achieve that vision. Thus, we were challenged to not stand still, but rather to go and be the Church by putting our gifts into action for that vision. We now

move on from that focus into a focus on the one body - and the fruitful practices provide us a guide for our vision as the one body. During this focus, pray about where God may be calling us to go as our one body and how these practices may play into that. Also, reflect on those gifts and how you may use YOUR gifts to help build towards that vision - a vision which involves these fruitful practices. For indeed these practices are a guide to our vision as the one body!

July 28 – "Intentional Faith Development: Learning to Soar"

(Pastor Jeremy will be on vacation August 4; Pastor Laurie Krieg will be preaching)

August 11 – "Passionate Worship is Grateful Worship"

(Hamilton Road Singers will be leading worship on August 18)

August 25 – "Risk-Taking Mission and Service: Risky Business"

September 1 – "Extravagant Generosity: A Great Church is a Generous Church?"



Throughout the year, we hold fundraisers (Easter Butterflies, Coins for Lent...) and collect money (last Sunday loose change) for our Change the World fund. But where exactly does this money go? Over the next 4 months, we will be highlighting each of the four groups we support through these donations: The Susanna Wesley House in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, Sohail Samuel's Children's Development Mission School in Pakistan, Kelly Cooke's work with student athletes at Pitt through Coalition for Christian Outreach, and the Ashtabula County Children's Services kinship program. Our hope with these features is to become better connected to the impact of your generosity.

Since Sohail Samuel and his wife, Jennifer, recently visited JUMC to share about their work, we wanted our first feature to be his Children's Development Mission school in Pakistan.


"The school has changed the lives of thousands of young people of the course of the last 23 years as Sohail, his wife Jennifer, and his family have sacrificed their own comfort and inheritance to advance the gospel through the love of Christ in a community that could have been terribly hostile to them. Instead, it has been transformed through the power of the Holy Spirit's work. As Sohail began this school under a tree with two students nearly 23



years ago, he was convinced that God was calling him to be salt & light in a community of people who desperately needed the flavor of God's love and the light of truth and knowledge. He saw a vision of children from two faiths, whose parents were at odds with each other, standing hand in hand in peace and friendship. Though there are still dangers and a delicacy to what has been built in this village, God has brought these two opposing sides closer and closer, giving favor to Sohail and his work, as he has sowed the seeds of God's love. Now, there is a school of children (270 of them) who live as neighbors and friends. Their families are in a community together and come to school events together. The local district

governmental leaders have visited the school and sat on the stage with a known Christian

man who has provided education to children without discrimination and with the extravagant love of Christ. They are unable to live as overtly as we are here in America, but their faithful lives have brought peace and hope to a community that didn't have it not so long ago."



Stay tuned throughout August, as we share more information about Sohail's work and some of the exciting projects they hope to accomplish in the coming years.
