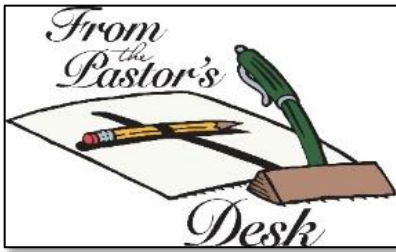

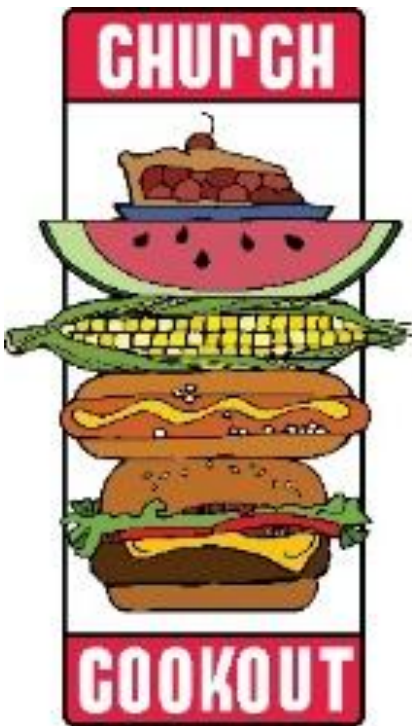
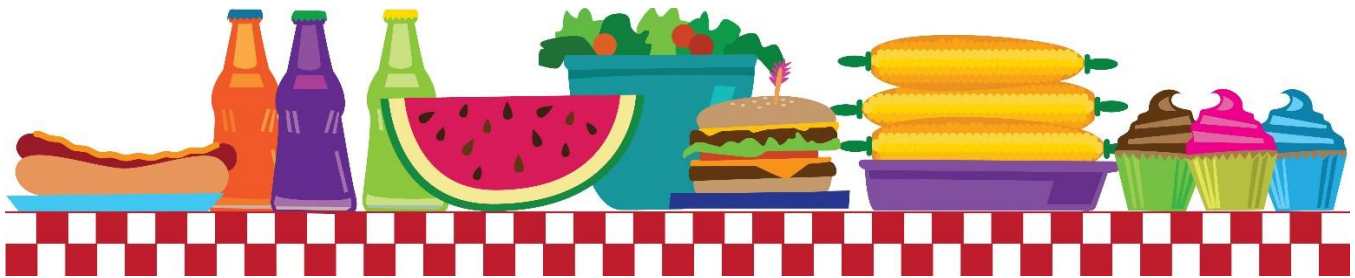

Sun. July 27 – The Courtyard

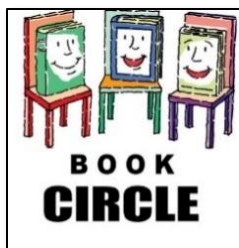

During their recent meeting, Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church engaged in reflective conversations, and on May 7, 2025 delivered four peace and justice pastoral letters concerning four social concerns for prayerful dialogue, discernment and witness. In addition to the Bishop's pastoral letters, Church and

Society offers these position statements on the same peace and justice issues as a way to learn about the issues, provide dialogue, model social witness and take action from the perspective of the United Methodist Church.

A Call for Peace in the Democratic Republic of Congo

POSITION STATEMENT Peace in the Democratic Republic of the Congo

The General Board of Church and Society of The United Methodist Church stands with faith leaders around the world in calling for peace in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and in condemning the violence and human rights abuses committed by armed groups, government forces and others in the region.

For nearly three decades the eastern part of the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) has been torn by a succession of wars that have cost an estimated 6 million lives.

A Plea for Ceasefire and Justice in Palestine and Israel

POSITION STATEMENT A Just Peace in Israel and Palestine

The General Board of Church and Society of The United Methodist Church laments the loss of innocent lives of Palestinians and Israelis, opposes continued military occupation, the confiscation of Palestinian land and water resources, the destruction of Palestinian homes, the continued building of illegal Jewish settlements, and any vision of a "Greater Israel" that includes the occupied territories and Jerusalem.

It's time to break the cycle of violence by addressing the root causes of conflict and work for a just peace in the Middle East.

A Call to Reject Violence Against Transgender Persons

POSITION STATEMENT LGBTQIA+ Human Rights

The General Board of Church and Society of the United Methodist Church advocates for all civil society laws that uphold the dignity, worth and protection of LGBTQIA+ people, ensuring that they are treated equally and have the same fundamental rights as everyone else.

As United Methodists, we believe basic human rights, civil liberties and protections are due all persons regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.

A Stand Against the Dismantling of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Policies

POSITION STATEMENT Eliminating Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

The General Board of Church and Society of The United Methodist Church supports Diversity, Equity and Inclusion policies as acts of restorative justice seeking to honor and advance all persons and to eliminate exclusion and discrimination.

The Trump administration has set out to eliminate "Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion" (DEI), a term which generally refers to movements for racial justice, LGBTQIA+ rights and women's equality.
